

On Sundays and other Major Feasts there follows, standing as able.

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,

the only Son of God,

eternally begotten of the Father,

God from God, Light from Light,

true God from true God,

begotten, not made,

of one Being with the Father,

Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven,

was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary

and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father,

who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified,

who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Fill them with the wisdom you gave your servant John XXIII that, following his example, we may reach out to other Christians in the love of your Son and labor together to kindle a de-

sire for justice and peace throughout the nations of the world.

LEADER: We pray for the peace of the world, that a spirit of respect and forbearance may grow among

nations and peoples.

PEOPLE: Grant that all those who hold authority in the nations, especially those in Russia, the

Ukraine and the Middle East, bend their hearts and minds toward seeking justice; honoring the image of God in all humanity; and uniting the world in bonds of love.

LEADER: We pray for the safety of all who serve in local, state, and national police forces and all who

serve in any branch of our national armed forces, at home or abroad.

PEOPLE: Grant that they may live with honor, serve with justice, and protect with mercy in the

course of their duties.

LEADER: We pray for our families, friends and neighbors who live and work in this community. We

are concerned for their sorrows and suffering.

PEOPLE: Come alongside us and cradle the ones we love in your strong arms, as we name each one:

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never cease to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

The Martyrs of Uganda (1886): On June 3, 1886, 32 members of the court of King Mwanga of Buganda (a Bantu kingdom in Uganda) were burned to death for their refusal to renounce Christianity. In the following months, many other Christians were similarly killed for their faith. The example of the martyrs, who walked to their death singing hymns and praying for their enemies, so inspired bystanders that they began to seek instruction from the remaining Christians. The martyrs had left the indelible impression that Christianity was truly African, not simply a white man's religion.

**John XXIII (Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli), Bishop**: Expected at his election to be a minor placeholder pope, during the first year of his pontificate he called the Second Vatican Council for the purpose of renewing and revitalizing the church. The work of the Council was transforming, not only for Roman Catholics, but for all Christians, and its emphasis on liturgical renewal, ecumenism, world peace and social justice continue to resonate throughout the Body of Christ.

**Boniface (754), Bishop and Missionary**. Born in England and professed as a monk and a priest, he was inspired to become a missionary. In 719, Pope Gregory II commissioned him to work in Germany. For the rest of his life, Boniface devoted himself to reforming, planting, and organizing churches, monasteries, and dioceses in Hesse, Thuringia, and Bavaria.

Melania the Elder (410), Monastic: A Christian Roman aristocrat who was widowed at the age of 22, Melania gave her only surviving child into the care of a guardian so that she might pursue a monastic vocation. She founded two monasteries on the Mount of Olives whose communities practiced hospitality for the many pilgrims who came to the sites of Christ's passion and resurrection, all paid for by Melania. She promoted theological tolerance and the unity of Christianity. A committed scholar, she was a teacher and spiritual director to many of the most prominent theologians and spiritual writers of her day.
