

The Sermon

On Sundays and other Major Feasts there follows, standing as able.

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,

the only Son of God,

eternally begotten of the Father,

God from God, Light from Light,

true God from true God,

begotten, not made,

of one Being with the Father,

Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven,

was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary

and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father,

who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified,

who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

LEADER: In this liturgical period of Ordinary Time in which we strive to become the extraordinary messengers of the Gospel that our baptism has commissioned us to be, let us offer our intercessions and thanksgivings to God.

We pray for the holy Church of God and for its mission.

PEOPLE: Grant that its divisions may cease; that it may be filled with truth and love; and that it may continue in the teaching of St. Peter and St. Paul and all the apostles, and bear faithful witness to the Gospel of Christ.

LEADER: We pray for Michael, our Presiding Bishop, for Andy, Jeff, Kai and Hector, our own bishops; for Mark and Meg, our priests, and for Margaret our deacon; and for all other ministers and for all the holy people of God.

PEOPLE: Pour out upon them your Holy Spirit and grant them the power to speak your Word with all boldness, that, by their teaching and preaching, our young shall see visions of a world renewed, and our old shall dream dreams of the New Jerusalem.

LEADER: We pray for the peace of the world, that a spirit of respect and forbearance may grow among nations and peoples.

PEOPLE: Grant that all those who hold authority in the nations bend their hearts and minds toward seeking justice; honoring the image of God in all humanity; forging mutual respect and understanding between different cultures; and uniting the world in bonds of love.

LEADER: We pray for the safety of all who serve in local, state, and national police forces and all who serve in any branch of our national armed forces, at home or abroad.

PEOPLE: Grant that they may live with honor, serve with justice, and protect with mercy in the course of their duties.

LEADER: We pray for our families, friends and neighbors who live and work in this community. We are concerned for their sorrows and suffering.

PEOPLE: Grant that we may have the wisdom to see in that diversity the evidence of your image. Strengthen our efforts to blot out ignorance and prejudice, until our knowledge of your love is made perfect in our love for all your children.

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LEADER: We pray for all who have died in the communion of your Church, and for those whose faith

is known to you alone, that, with all the saints, they may have rest in that place where there

is no pain or grief, but life eternal.

PEOPLE: Grant that we, who have been raised with Christ, may abide in his love and rejoice in

the hope of eternal glory.

LEADER: Rejoicing in the fellowship of the ever-blessed Virgin Mary, blessed Paul and all the saints,

let us commend ourselves, and one another, and all our life to Christ our God.

PEOPLE: To you our God and Savior.

Then the Celebrant continues

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never cease to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. AMEN.



Feast Days June 26, Isabel Florence Hapgood, Ecumenist (1928): A lifelong Episcopalian, Isabel Hapgood was a force behind ecumenical relations between the episcopal Church and Russian Orthodoxy in the United States around the turn of the 20th century. She had a talent for studying languages and possessed the gift of being able to translate the subtleties of Russian into English. Her love of Russian Orthodoxy and its Divine Liturgy led her to seek the permission of the hierarchy to translate the rites into English. The work, Service Book of the Holy Orthodox-Catholic Church, took 11 years to complete. It received support of the Russian Orthodox bishops in North America; and Isabel Hapgood is faithfully remembered among Russian Orthodox Christians in North America for her contributions to their common life, her desire for closer relations between Orthodox and Anglican Christians, and for making the liturgical treasures of their tradition available to the English-speaking world.

July 1, Pauli Murray, Priest (1985): An early and committed civil rights activist, Pauli Murray was the first African American woman ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church. After graduating from Hunter College in 1933, she was denied admission to graduate school at the University of North Carolina because of her race. After graduating from Howard University Law School in 1944, she was denied admission to Harvard for an advanced law degree because of her gender. Murray received her Master's of Law from the University of California (Berkeley) in 1945. In 1948, she was hired by the Methodist Church to compile information about segregation laws in the South. Her research led to a book which became a foundational document for Thurgood Marshall in his work on the Supreme Court decision *Brown v. Board of Education*. In later life, she discerned a call to the priesthood, and was ordained a deacon in June 1976 and a priest in January 1977.

July 2, Moses the Black, Monastic and Martyr (c.400): In his early life, Moses of Ethiopia was leader of a robber band. While fleeing from authorities, he took shelter with a group of monks who so impressed Moses with their faithfulness and kindness that he chose to be baptized and to remain with them. He led an ascetic life, lived in a simple cell, and ate only ten ounces of dry bread each day. It is to Moses that one of the most famous pieces of advice from desert monasticism is attributed: "Go, sit in your cell, and your cell will teach you everything."

July 6, Eva Lee Matthews, Monastic (1928): Born in 1862, Eva Lee Matthews grew up as an active member of the Episcopal Church. While working at Bethany Mission House, an Episcopal charitable organization, she and a co-worker, Beatrice Henderson, discerned a call to create a new Episcopal religious order which was to assist Cincinnati's poor, especially children. Eva became the community's first superior, taking the name Mother Eva Mary. In 1898, the Episcopal Church formally recognized the order, naming the group the Community of the Transfiguration. By the 1920's the Community had members engaged in ministries throughout Ohio and in Hawaii and China. The Community continues to serve the church through a variety of ministries in Ohio, California, and the Dominican Republic.
